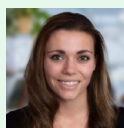

Delegated Credentialing Process Requirements

For a delegation agreement between two entities to be successful, a rigorous process is required in order to uphold strong compliance and protect the safety of patients. The entity conducting the credentialing process will need to adhere to standards set forth by NCQA, CMS, and state governing bodies—all while maintaining detailed records for regular auditability.

Credentialing processes must include the review and verification of the following information:

- State licensure
- DEA Registration
- CDS Certification
- Board Certification/Specialty
- Education
- Malpractice History
- Professional Liability Claims Settlement History
- Work History
- Hospital/Facility Affiliations
- Disclosure Questions
- Attestation
- Sanctions & Exclusions
